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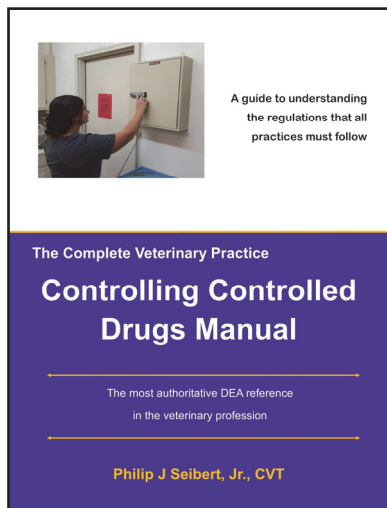

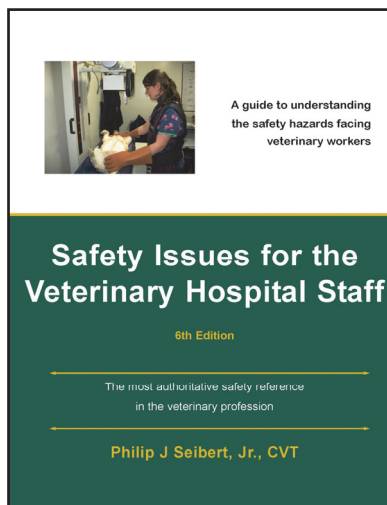

Safety Signs

These waterproof vinyl signs are suitable for most locations in the veterinary hospital. Self-adhesive signs stick to most surfaces. Magnetic signs are great for metal doors because they can be repositioned. Laminated signs are perfect for temporary or permanent applications. Each sign measures approximately 8" wide by 5" high.

Eye Wash Station

1. Turn on cold water at the faucet
2. Pull knob on front of the eye wash device
3. Place eyes in the water stream
4. Adjust temperature until it is comfortable
